Board, Faculty and Teaching Assignments

The unique feature of the MILE Program is its faculty. Leading experts from major research and teaching centers, government and international organizations as well as private practice illuminate the law and policies underlying and associated with the World Trade Organization.

Members of the Board

The MILE Program, set forth in the Program flyer, was designed by six professors of law and economics. Part of the international faculty, they share the responsibility for the quality and format of the Program. On the Board, they are supported by the Rector of the University of Berne.

- **Jean-Louis Juvet**, *professor emeritus, University of Neuchâtel*, Chairman of the Board of the WTI Foundation. After obtaining a doctorate at the University of Neuchâtel, Professor Juvet joined the OECD Secretariat in Paris. He later returned to the University of Neuchâtel as a full-time professor of international trade. He was also director general of a European trade organization in Paris and Brussels.
- **Christoph Schaeublin**, *Rector of the University of Bern*, member of the Board. He is a former full-time professor of classical philology at the University of Berne and the acting chairman of the Conference of Rectors of Swiss Universities. Professor Schaeublin represents the University of Berne and will act as a general adviser, facilitating relations with the host University and support granted to the Institute by this University.
- **Professor Richard Edward Baldwin**, *Graduate Institute of International Studies, Geneva*, member of the Board. A full-time professor of international economics at the Graduate Institute since 1991, Prof. Baldwin obtained a Ph.D. at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Before coming to Switzerland, he was Associate Professor at Columbia University Business School. Prof. Baldwin has published extensively in the fields of trade, economic growth and European integration and has been a consultant for the European Commission, EFTA, OECD, and the World Bank. Prof. Baldwin was senior staff economist for the President's Council of Economic Advisors in the Bush Administration (1990-1991). He was associate editor of the *European Economic Review*. Prof. Baldwin is currently active as a research associate of the National Bureau of Economic Research, Cambridge. Since

1991, he has been serving as co-director of the International Trade Programme of the Centre of Economic Policy Research and is an elected member of the Council of the European Economic Association. Presently, Prof. Baldwin is managing editor of *Economic Policy*, an academic journal dealing with important economic policy issues.

- **Thomas Cottier**, *University of Bern*, member of the Board and Managing Director of the World Trade Institute. A full-time professor of European and international economic law, Professor Cottier obtained a doctorate from the University of Berne and taught at the Universities of St. Gallen and Neuchâtel. He was previously with the Federal Office of External Economic Affairs of Switzerland, served as a deputy director general of the Swiss Intellectual Property Office, and represented Switzerland throughout the Uruguay Round negotiations. He has published widely in the field of trade regulation and has extensive experience as a member and chairman of GATT /WTO panels. He is a member of the Council of the Swiss National Research Foundation and of the board of trustees of IPGRI (International Plant Genetic Resources Institute, Rome). He is of counsel to the worldwide law firm of Baker & McKenzie, a member of the International Trade Law Committee of the International Law Association, of the editorial board of the *Journal of International Economic Law*, and an associate editor of the *Journal of World Trade*.
- **Petros C. Mavroidis**, *University of Neuchâtel*, member of the Board. A full-time professor of public international law, European Community law, and international trade law, Professor Mavroidis earned a doctorate from the University of Heidelberg. Having previously worked in the legal service of the WTO, he now serves as counselor in the WTO's Technical Cooperation Division. He has published extensively in the fields of international trade, EC, and public international law and was recently appointed co-rapporteur of the International Trade Law Committee of the International Law Association and visiting professor at Columbia University, New York. He is also a member of the Council of the World Trade Law Association and an associate editor of the *Journal of World Trade*.
- **Jaime de Melo**, *University of Geneva*, member of the Board. A full-time professor of economics, Professor de Melo holds a Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University. He is a fellow of the Centre for Economic Policy Research and a former division chief in the Research Department of the World Bank. He has written extensively on trade policy.
- **Nicolas Michel**, *University of Fribourg*, member of the Board. Formerly a full-time professor of public international law, he is the acting director-general of the Swiss Department of International Law in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs while keeping his academic affiliation. Professor Michel has a doctorate from the University of Fribourg. He teaches part-time in Fribourg and previously taught at the Universities of Geneva and Lausanne and at the Federal Institute of Technology (Lausanne) and the Università della Svizzera Italiana. He was a member of the Federal Board of Appeals for Federal

Government Procurement. He has devoted much of his research in the past two decades to public procurement and has published widely in this field.

- **Damien J. Neven**, *Graduate Institute of International Studies, Geneva*, member of the Board. A full-time professor at the Graduate Institute since October 2001, Professor Neven was, until recently, a professor at Hautes Etudes Commerciales (HEC) Lausanne. He has a Ph.D. in economics from Nuffield College, Oxford. He previously taught at INSEAD and the University of Brussels. He has published extensively in the fields of European economic integration and industrial organization, with a particular emphasis on competition issues. He is a member of the Academic Advisory Group to the Directorate General for Competition of the European Commission, and he teaches at the College d'Europe in Brugge. He serves as an associate editor of the International Journal of Industrial Organization.
